Native Plant Resources for San Juan County

This handout addresses the questions: Where can I buy plants and seed native to San Juan County? And how do I grow them?

PLANT AND SEED NURSERIES

There are a lot of great native plant nurseries. This list concentrates on those that provide species native to San Juan County and the greater region.

The Center for Natural Lands Management sells native seed in bulk, some of which is of San Juan County origin. cnlm.org/native-seed-nursery

Fourth Corner Nursery is a well-established, wholesale native plant nursery in Whatcom County. They sell primarily bare-root stock of shrubs, trees, wetland plants, forbs. Much of their material is of western Washington origin. fourthcornernurseries.com 360-592-2250

Heritage Seedlings in Oregon sells native seed wholesale, most of it of Willamette Valley origin. Their website also has great information about site preparation and seeding. heritageseedlings.com 503-585-9835

Inside Passage Seeds in Port Townsend sells wild-collected seeds from the Salish Sea region. insidepassageseeds.com 360-385-6114

The Master Gardener Foundation of San Juan County holds an annual native plant sale in early spring, specializing in bare root trees and shrubs and as well as some container plants: mgfsjc.org

Northwest Meadows based on Whidbey Island sells a regional wildflower mix and other native grass and wildflower seed, with detailed species descriptions. Some of their offerings are of Whidbey Island or nearby origin. Also great "how-to" information. northwestmeadows.com

Oxbow Farm and Conservation Center near Carnation grows a wide variety of Western Washington container plants using organic and sustainable practices. oxbow.org 425-788-1134 ext. 4

The Pacific Rim Institute on Whidbey Island runs a plant and seed nursery primarily for restoring their own site, but also takes orders and sells seeds and plants when available. pacificriminstitute.org

Plantas Nativas is a retail native plant nursery in Whatcom County, selling species native to western Washington. plantasnativa.com 360-715-9655

The Plant Materials Center in Bow, Washington, sells bare-root shrubs and trees, some of western Washington origin. wacdpmc.org 360-757-1094

Satinflower Nurseries on Vancouver Island is a retail nursery selling local, native container plants and seed. While their offerings are perfect for San Juan County, unfortunately they can't sell/ship across the international boundary. Their website has excellent resources on plant selection and "how to". <https://satinflower.ca/>

The Salish Seeds Project in San Juan County specializes in grasses and wildflowers of oak, prairie, and coastal habitats of San Juan County. Plants and seed are grown primarily by special order with occasional local plant sale events. sjclandbank.org/the-salish-seeds-project-bringing-back-island-wildflowers
